

**Presidential Address Delivered at the Entrance Ceremony  
Kyoto Junior College of Foreign Languages, April 1, 2012**

As students, you are expected to acquire both an all-around command of foreign languages and a broad knowledge of history and cultures. These skills and this knowledge are today not only necessary for finding a decent job, but also essential for becoming an active and valued global citizen.

The best colleges of foreign languages are places where you can study other languages and cultures and, by doing so, become able to experience foreign countries and their cultures through your daily campus life, and then continue to study wherever you choose to go, or wherever life may take you.

With this in mind, I am now in the process of promoting an environmental improvement project on our college campus. I want you to feel at ease and to feel free to speak the foreign languages that you are learning here on campus. I want you to take the opportunity to experience a foreign atmosphere without actually leaving Japan. I believe that you will be able to deepen your understanding of, and feel familiar with, foreign countries through campus life at our college. That, in turn, will make stronger each student's motivation to learn and grow as a civilized person.

In the age of globalization, it is getting more and more necessary for us to work together with people who live in other parts of the world, people who speak a variety of different languages.

You and I know that our lives here in Japan depend on good communication with foreign peoples. Globalization requires us to work calmly and collaboratively with others. To communicate accurately and logically in a foreign language are vital virtues and the very qualities that we hope all our students can strive to achieve. Clear communication is what strengthens our systems of international peace and security.

So, freshmen, study well and you will be ready to start playing an active part in the international community. And remember this: the root of all learning is curiosity, and when curiosity is combined with focused attention and the effort to understand, our minds grow rich. And in that way, our lives also become more meaningful. I repeat, curiosity and attentiveness, and efforts to understand.

The faculty and staff of our schools are prepared and eager to help you enrich your minds so that you can become full-fledged participants in the international community.

For my part, I am firmly determined to make Kyoto Junior College of Foreign Languages a valuable and even beloved place for you, and to make your student life worthwhile here in the city of Kyoto. And it is my sincere hope that you will say, "I am very happy and pleased to be admitted to this college, and I am proud to be a student of Kyoto Junior College of Foreign Languages."

As one of the leaders of this college, I chose to deliver my speech in English at today's entrance ceremony. I have spoken in English with the genuine hope of encouraging you.
